DRUG SAFETY UPDATE

Paracetamol and pregnancy – reminder that taking paracetamol during pregnancy remains safe.

Patients should be reminded and reassured that there is no evidence that taking paracetamol during pregnancy causes autism in children. Paracetamol is recommended as the first-choice pain reliever for pregnant women, used at the lowest dose and for the shortest duration. It also acts as an antipyretic and is therefore used to treat fever. Patients should not stop taking their pain medicines as untreated pain and fever can pose risks to the unborn child.

BOOK YOUR WINTER VACCINE


Eligible patients can book their appointments via Patient Services.

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COVID 19 CAMPAIGN

AUTUMN 2025

Vaccination remains the best form of defence against severe illness, hospitalisation, and death as a result of COVID-19. The COVID-19 vaccination is aimed at protecting the most vulnerable in our society.

Appointments for Covid vaccination clinics will be available to book from mid September on line or via reception.

Eligible Patients are:

- all adults aged 75 years and over; born before 31 March 1951.
- residents in a care home for older adults (in NI this will apply to all residents of a care home for older adults);
- individuals aged 6 months and over who are immunosuppressed


Unlike in previous autumn campaigns, adults aged 65 to 74 years of age and people aged under 65 years of age with underlying medical conditions, including pregnant women (apart from those who are immunosuppressed) will not be eligible for Covid vaccination.

JCVI does not advise the inclusion of health and social care workers (HSCWs).

Immunosuppressed patients aged 5 to 17 years (i.e. those born between 1 October 2008 and 31 September 2020), are advised that they are eligible for vaccination, and can attend a Trust led clinic to receive the vaccine.

Community Pharmacies will be responsible for vaccination of all care home residents, including mop-up visits.







RSV VACCINATION

RSV is a common respiratory virus that can cause serious lung infections.

For most people, RSV infection It is a leading cause of infant causes a mild respiratory illness. Globally, RSV infects up to 90% of children within the first 2 years of life and frequently reinfects older children and Adults are invited for the RSV adults.

While RSV infection can occur at any age, the risk and severity of RSV and its complications are increased in older adults and in neonates and small infants.

The clinical significance of RSV in infants is that it can cause bronchiolitis which

leads to the inflammation of the small airways and significant breathing difficulties.

Infants receive the RSV vaccine as part of their baby vaccination schedule.

AUTUMN FLU VACCINATION PROGRAMME

Child nasal flu appointments are available to book for pre-school children aged from two years of age, born between 2nd July 2021 and 1st Sept 2024. Appointments are available to book online or via telephone after 9.30am any morning.

Appointments for the Flu vaccine will be available to book from mid September for all patients aged 65 years and over born on or before 31st March 1961 and for those in an AT RISK group.

In 2025/26, healthy 5-64 year olds will NOT be eligible for the flu vaccination.

Flu can be serious,

if you are over 65 or in an 'at risk' group.

Between 18 September 2024 and 18 May 2025

3 1 5 8 people aged 18 and over had a hospital admission with influenza in Northern Ireland.

2155 were as an emergency hospital admission.



If eligible help protect yourself against flu

Last year 862 children and young people, and 3,158 people aged 18 and over were hospitalised with influenza in Northern Ireland. Of those 2,922 were as an emergency hospital admission.

This year the flu vaccine is being offered to:

- all adults aged 65 years and over;
- people aged six months to 64 years in a clinical risk group, as laid out in the Immunisation Green Book influenza chapter (Green Book);
- pregnant women;
- residents and staff in care homes;
- all health and social care workers;
- all preschool children aged two to four years on 1 September 2025;
- all primary and secondary school children (up to and including year 12);
- carers;
- close contacts of immunocompromised individuals.

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The COVID-19 vaccination will be offered to:

- adults aged 75 years and over;
- residents in care homes for older adults;
- individuals who are immunosuppressed, aged 6 months and over.



SICKLINES AFTER HOSPITAL CARE

If you are likely to need a sickline (AKA a "sick cert" or a Med3) when you come out of hospital or following Outpatient attendance please ask the Dr treating you in hospital to provide you with one before you leave. This information sheet gives you some myths and facts about this issue

Why is this important? Why doesn't the GP just do it?

Thousands of appointments and telephone calls with GPs are taken up each year by patients requesting fit notes when they could have been issued by Hospital Drs and Healthcare Professionals.

This has a direct effect on how other patients can access the GP. Please help us to keep our appointments free for patients who have genuine clinical need rather than administrative paperwork that could easily have been dealt with by others at the end of your hospital visit or stay.

MYTHS

"Consultants and junior doctors don't write sicklines, that's a GP's job"

"The hospital don't have any sickline pads" - the hospital order these like many other stationary items from BSO

"The hospital can't issue a sickline if you've only been to outpatients"

FACTS

The doctor who is treating you at the time has a statutory obligation to provide you with a sickline if you need one. This includes all Hospital doctors. The Dr who is treating you should sign you off for the appropriate period according to the condition you have been treated for.

Each fit note in first six months of an illness can only have a maximum duration of 3 months. Many patients will not need that length of med3 and a note is not required to go back to work sooner than the duration



Patient Home Visits by a GP



WE'VE MADE A CHANGE

From now on our team at Meadowbridge Surgery will focus on what we do best- providing you with appropriate care in the practice.

Carrying out complex post-operative dressings is not our job and all Hospital Services within NI have been collectively informed that they must continue to provide care to their patients until it is appropriate to either discharge them or ask GP Treatment Rooms to take over- this will be when the patients dressing needs changed once or twice a week and requires simple dressing techniques.

While this decision has been made as part of GPs' Collective Action to try to match what services we provide to the existing funding, we also think that this is a safer service for patients. Surgical teams will have a better oversight of how you are healing and they will be best placed to intervene if problems arise.

This does not have any impact on provision of GP services to you.

Our Treatment Room staff have been asked to adhere to this guidance and need to treat patients equally so please show them understanding if they advise they are not able to take over your dressings from the surgical team.
